## **UW's Public History Project**

In December 2021, Kacie Lucchini Butcher, director of the UW–Madison Public History Project, shared stories of the discrimination students, faculty, and staff of color and minority status have experienced since the founding of UW. Kacie and UW students have worked over the past two years reading newspaper reports and yearbooks, combing the UW Archives, and interviewing members of the UW community about their experiences with prejudice or discrimination; how they resisted it, and in some cases overcame it. This includes instances of racial, ethnic, and religious discrimination, and prejudice against those who identify as LGBTQ or who live with a disability. Bias against these groups has been most evident in the areas of housing and campus life, academic life, student organizations. and athletics.

The outcomes of this project include a public exhibit of the project's findings in fall 2022, and annual reports and student-generated articles that can be found online at <a href="https://publichistoryproject.wisc.edu/">https://publichistoryproject.wisc.edu/</a>.
